



Figure 16: Cumulative COVID-19 cases in Alberta by zone and date reported to Alberta Health. Cases without a postal code or incorrect postal codes are labelled as unknown. Last updated: March 3

## UPDATE COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution

Strict cold-chain requirements ensure vaccine efficacy

- Pfizer-BioNTech: Ultra-frozen storage (-60C to -80C)
- Moderna: Frozen storage (-15C to -25C)
- AstraZeneca and Janssen: Fridge storage (+2C to +8C)





## **COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution**

Our first phase of vaccinations was provided to AHS staff and physicians

Vaccine Distribution Prioritization considered 3 factors:

- Avoid acute care utilization
- Protect vulnerable workforce
- Prevent outbreaks

### COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution

- Second dose given within 42 days of first dose (LTC/DSL residents are 3-4 weeks between doses)
- 14 days after first dose, about 92% of people are protected, for several weeks
- Second dose is needed to prolong protection
- PPE still required at this time unknown if vaccine also protects against spread
- AEFI (Adverse Event Following Immunization) reporting



#### Phase 2 (AstraZeneca): Starting March 10

The following groups can receive the AstraZeneca vaccine early if they do not have a severe chronic illness:

- Albertans aged 50 to 64
- First Nations, Métis and Inuit (FNMI) individuals aged 35 to 49

Appointments will open in stages by birth year, one year at a time:

- March 10: Born in 1957 or FNMI Born in 1972
- Following birth years and dates will be announced while supply lasts


#### Phase 2 (Group A): Starting week of March 15

Group A can book appointments starting the week of March 15.

- Staff and residents of licensed supportive living (seniors) not included in Phase 1
- First Nations, Inuit and Métis people aged 50 and older, no matter where they live
- Albertans aged 65 to 74, no matter where they live:
  - booking dates will open by year of birth, one year at a time, to reduce wait times
  - exact dates will be announced the week of March 15


### LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES

-----Daily active cases -----Number of outbreaks -----




### DESIGNATED SUPPORTIVE LIVING


-----Active cases ----- Death Daily ----- Number of outbreaks in DSL
